Minutes of the Meeting held on 15<sup>th</sup> January 2018 at 7.30pm in Lydeard St Lawrence Village Hall.

- 18/02 Declarations of interest Cllr Hobson declared an interest in the Church Development Project 18/08
- 18/03 The **Minutes** of the meeting held on 4<sup>th</sup> December 2017 were agreed as an accurate record.

#### 18/04 Matters Arising

#### **Tolland Phone Box Update – Tolland Book Exchange** (17/96, 17/80, (17/30))

John Brand has completed the paving around the box. Cllr Harding reported that he had done a lovely job and that local residents were happy with their new look box. The phone box is now a book exchange and notice board and has been working well, although someone had mentioned the phone box was not big enough for all the books and required another!

Cllr Marshall thanked John Brand for his work and Cllr Harding for all the effort she has put into the Project, which is now a great asset for the village of Tolland.

Cllr Harding requested recommendations in sourcing signage for the box, suggestions were to contact Bagborough and Pitminster Parish Councils as they have completed similar projects.

#### **Reporting to Somerset Highways**

102.2 The post and rail fencing along Quickbeam Lane is rotten and collapsing, which has left the road edge unclear and hazardous. Cllr Marshall would report to the SCC.

102.3 Cllr Harding reported that Tolland Lane near the junction with Tarr Road had a large area of standing water across the lane. Further drainage would be better than a gully and Cllr Marshall would report this to SCC.

Cllr Marshall has reported the Tolland issue to SCC but has had no response. It was added that the lane in Nethercott also has issues with subsidence and this should also be reported.

#### 18/07 Village Defibrillator in Lydeard St Lawrence and Tolland (17/97, (17/71))

Cllrs had spoken to several professionals regarding the benefits of having a rural Defibrillator, with mixed responses. All have suggested that training in CPR should be given to local residents. Cllr Vickery has spoken to Heartsafe again, the suggested installers, and they agreed to come and talk with the Parish Council at the next meeting. Cllrs thought this was a good idea and asked if they could come to the next meeting on 5<sup>th</sup> March.

#### 18/08 CBF- Church Development Project – Paul Yeomans

Paul Yeomans made a presentation to the Parish Council outlining the Church Development Project. Initially the project was set up to get a water supply in to the Church. Having set up a project team in February 2017 who researched what the church would actually benefit from the project has progressed to make the building suitable for community use in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century and creating the Church Development Project. So far, the project team have made a Statement of Significance, have a summary of ideas and selected a suitable architect. To move the project forward they have sourced funding from the Awards for All scheme to kick-start the projects finances.

The next part of the Project would see work carried out on the approach to the war memorial for the 2018 Armistice Centenary celebrations in November. Tree roots under the path need to be removed and the Path needs resurfacing from the section from the road up to and around the War Memorial. The job has previously been estimated at about £3000, but 3 contractors will be asked for quotations.

#### The Church Development Project Requests:

- That the Parish Council notes the progress made by the Church Development Project Team, endorses the project in principle and takes part in the public engagement and consultation on the detailed proposals.
- That the Parish Council supports the idea of an Armistice Centenary Celebration. Could we set up a joint project team to progress the resurfacing and organise a celebration for armistice day?
- Could we have a commitment from the Parish Council to fund a proportion of the resurfacing work? Could authority to release the funding (subject to conditions) be delegated so that it is not held up by the meeting cycle?

The above 3 requests were noted by the Council.

- Cllr Marshall thanked Paul Yeomans for his presentation to the Council and thanked him and his team for the progress that has been made so far.
- Moving forward Cllr Marshall volunteered to be the Parish Council representative for the project and was especially interested in the Centenary Armistice Celebrations improvements.
- As with any funding request from the Parish Council, 3 quotations would need to be gained and until the Council have seen these quotes cannot commit to releasing funds. However as in previous communications between the Church and the Parish Council money is available in the Footpaths Fund for improvements to the War memorial path and CIL money for the community to use and is available for this project.

#### 18/09 White Space Broadband (17/101)

Cllr White has had an initial meeting with White Space Broadband who feel confident they can provide a reliable wireless broadband solution within the area. Cllr White will be setting up a meeting for the technical team to visit the area and put together some feasibility options for consideration and discussion at the next meeting. Cllr White acknowledged that several expressions of interest had been made, primarily from the Tarr and Chapel Leigh areas and encouraged more people to get in touch and register their interest/queries with him via email. (edward@willettfarm.co.uk). These are helpful in planning coverage zones.

#### 18/10 Village Play Area and Equipment (17/102.1)

#### - Lydeard Saint Lawrence Parish Playground Project - Project update

Cllr Hele set out the initial planning for the Project which is looking at how to refurbish, update and improve the Parish Playground situated adjacent to the Cricket Club. Regular updates would now be provided to the Parish council at its meetings on Project progress and activities. Cllr Hele also briefed the Parish Council on:

#### Community Engagement:

Cllr Hele attended LSL Cricket Club meeting on behalf of the Parish Council to explain the outline project to address the Parish playground. The Cricket Club was fully supportive and is keen to be kept up to speed with progress.

Cllr Hele has discussed the Project with the Ladybirds group (Ali Morley) and the Primary School secretary (Lynne Ellis) – both are willing to promote and communicate messages regarding the project as the project develops.

#### Suppliers:

Initial engagement with 9 potential playground suppliers has been made, with one visiting the site in order to provide unsolicited initial feedback and ideas to the Project on what could be achieved both with the existing equipment and potential replacement.

#### Project Communications:

A draft poster/flyer has been produced and was shared with the Parish Council – once its content has been agreed, this will be sent out to as much of the community as possible via the Parish Newsletter, Parish Website, Parish notice boards and via Primary School/Ladybirds Group and Cricket Club communications channels.

An initial community consultation on the Project is planned for 7.30 pm on Friday  $16^{\text{th}}$  February in the LSL Village Hall (*see notice in Village reports. Ed*) – canvassing for volunteers to get involved with the project and gather interest on the type of playground the community would like to see in the Parish.

A questionnaire has been drafted that aims to gather initial feedback from the community across a range of Playground related topics (including how often people use the playground, what type of equipment they would like to see in the Parish etc).

#### Funding:

Cllr Hele has engaged initially with 4 potential funding organisations to outline the project aims and aspirations – application forms have been received and will be developed as the project gathers momentum as well as engagement with further potential funding opportunities.

#### **Did You Know ?**

**THE FEAST OF CANDLEMAS** (Presentation of the child Jesus in the Temple) is celebrated on Friday, 2nd February. This marks the end of the Christmas Season (when the church colour is White), and the church returns to Ordinary Time (Green) until Lent (Purple) begins.

**ASH WEDNESDAY** marks the beginning of the forty days of Lent, which precedes Holy Week when the Church thinks about Jesus' trial and crucifixion and then, on Easter Day, his Resurrection. As our Rector Matthew explained in his Fiveways article, what we do in Lent is based on ancient roots, going back to King David in the Old Testament. King David asked for God's forgiveness in three ways: by putting ashes on his head (as was the custom in those days), fasting and wearing sackcloth.

On Ash Wednesday, therefore, Christians are marked with the sign of the cross in ash on their forehead, in the same manner as they have been marked with water at their Baptism. Many people will have heard about "giving up something for Lent" which is where the "fasting" element comes in - this reminds us that Jesus gave up his life for us; and simplifying our way of life in recognition that we probably rely too heavily on material things in our lives - an opportunity to de-clutter!

**SHROVE TUESDAY** (Pancake Day) is also an opportunity to give up and de-clutter, in that its origins are in using up various foodstuffs and clearing out of store cupboards before Lent; a sort of last day of ordinary time before the penitential season of Lent. In Lent, we take the "e" out of feasting, and indulge in some fasting before the "e" returns in the Feast and Celebration on Easter Day.

#### **Somerset Libraries Service Consultation 2018**

I write to advise you that Cllr David Hall, Cabinet Member with responsibility for libraries for Somerset County Council, made the decision on the 18<sup>th</sup> January to go out to public consultation on the future delivery of library services across Somerset.

A public consultation is now planned to start on Monday 29 January and will last for 12 weeks, seeking to put the service on a sustainable footing for the long-term, at a time when all our council budgets are under enormous pressure.

Nine area proposals have been produced showing options on how to deliver library services in individual communities going forward.

In summary, under the proposals, 15 of our 34 libraries would be seeking community involvement to remain open. Where this is not possible, services would instead be provided either through outreach in community venues or through additional mobile library stops. For a further seven libraries, the County Council is consulting on two different options – either to seek community involvement or to keep existing library services as they currently are.

From **Monday 29 January**, members of the public, businesses and organisations will be asked to read the proposals online <u>www.somerset.gov.uk/librariesconsultation</u> and complete a questionnaire, basing their responses on the library they visit most often and putting forward possible alternative proposals for consideration. Library services will continue across Somerset whatever the response from this consultation and no decisions will be made until after the consultation concludes on 22 April and all results are fully analysed. We expect to make a final decision in June/July.

#### **Planning Renovations This Year?**

If you're thinking of a new extension, a bit of remodelling, or finally knocking down that old garage, have you checked for asbestos? Any property built or refurbished before 2000 could potentially contain ACMs (Asbestos Containing Materials). Commonly found in corrugated roofing sheets, it was also widely used in artex-type paint coatings, insulation material, floor tiles, other construction material, fixtures and fittings. Left undisturbed, these materials don't present a health risk. However, when damaged the fibres easily become airborne and can be inhaled. Exposure to these microscopic fibres can lead to severe lung disease and cancer. In the UK, around 5000 deaths a year are linked to asbestos exposure, and it can take years for symptoms to develop. Invisible to the naked eye and normally blended with other substances, professional testing is needed to ensure asbestos is dealt with safely.

Somerset Scientific Services, part of Somerset County Council, offer free impartial asbestos advice as part of our commitment to public health and safety. We also offer an expert service to identify and project manage the removal of any ACMs. Samples of suspect material can be sent to our lab for analysis and we'll provide impartial advice on your next steps if asbestos is identified. For larger projects surveys can be completed on site by our specialist asbestos team if needed.
