20/05 **Route 60**+

Liz McConnell spoke to the Council about her visit to Dulverton on 3rd December for the Route 60+ session held by Somerset Road Safety. Aimed at the over 60's and raising awareness in this group of the effects that ageing can have on our driving skills. A mix of services were present for an open session followed by an interactive presentation. Services included Fire and Rescue, Age UK, Information on borrowing money, aneurisms and solicitors. 20/08 **Budget and Precept**

After the Precept was set at the December meeting the Clerk has received notification from SW&T Council that the Tax Base has been amended due to changes in legislation. Therefore, the Parish Council has been asked to resubmit its request for the Precept figure.

The original request to keep the unit the same was 219.73, to keep the band D equivalent (unit) at £19.286 the same as this year the Council asked for £4237.71

The new tax base is 218.64, to keep the unit rate the same the Council would ask for £4216.69. To keep the original request this would be an increase of ½% per unit, bringing this figure to 19.382.

Cllrs agreed to keep the original request for the Precept amount.

20/10 Letter from Wiveliscombe Area Partnership – Update

Due to data protection WAP were unable to give any further information regarding Wivey Link users in the Parish. It was agreed that with the lack of information the Parish Council would not donate funds, keeping its support for the local Lydeard Lifts.

20/11 Highways/Roads Report

Cllr Marshall gave a report on some issues regarding the roads in the Parish.

The school have concerns over speeding vehicles outside the school building, some of the road markings and signs were not very visible. Cllr Marshall has cut back the vegetation to clear the signs but the road markings need repainting and Cllr Marshall has requested this. It is also thought that the church side sign is too close to the school and would be better located further back the road, together with a "SLOW" road marking to give vehicles a pre warning.

Gullies in both LSL and Tolland Villages are blocked, Nethercott Lane and East Town Lane have been reported. With freezing temperatures, the Tolland lanes are becoming icy with run off from blocked drains, some villagers have had cars slipping on the ice.

Nethercott Lane has issues with dips in the road, flooding and mud making the road tricky to navigate; subsidence is still an issue along the lane.

A slurry trailer has passed through the village and some has fallen off leaving a mess in in the road. All of these issues will be reported to SCC Highways.

20/12 SW&T Council Local Plan Issues and Options Consultation

The consultation was noted by Cllrs and were invited to take part.

20/13 Parish Clock

Paul Yeomans has been maintaining the Parish Clock on behalf the Parish voluntarily. The Parish Council would like thank him for his work and agreed to pay any Invoice for parts he requires.

20/14 "Awards for Service to the Community 2020".

Cllrs noted Awards and would all consider who they would like to nominate. This is open to all, so if any villagers would like to nominate someone please get in touch with the Chairman.

20/15 Any other Business

SWT Cllr Anthony Trollope-Bellew gave his report. He advised the Council to look at the two Consultations that are currently being carried out by SW&T Council. The first is the local plan already discussed. (20/12) The second is the proposals to the Employment Local Development Order (LDO) for small scale industrial space. The Employment LDO is a proactive planning tool to enable increased delivery of small-scale industrial space in rural parts of SWT, and was developed in response to demand from small businesses to set up or expand their existing operations. Cllr Trollope-Bellew then answered questions regarding the possibilities of a Somerset Unitary Council.

Cllr Telling has reported some damage on some of the footpath railings and stiles, it is believed some have now been repaired.

Cllr Harding requested that the Parish Council support Tolland Church in its refurbishment of the Church Gates. Cllrs agreed they would consider a formal financial request for funds. They will require a complete proposal and three quotations.

Cllr Harding requested that the finger post restoration project volunteers look at the fingerpost at Tolland

Cllr Harding report that a planning application had been withdrawn in Tolland as the applicant would be liable for CIL, she requested further information on how CIL is worked out and how much the Parish Council would get. Details are on SW&T website. She also requested clarity on planning legislation which was given.

With no other business the meeting was closed at 8.25pm. The next meeting will be on Monday 9th March 2020

DECEMBER WI MEETING

At our January meeting, eight people. braved the appalling weather. After our correspondence, Rosie Hather from ARC was introduced to speak about the Association. ARC was formerly Taunton Association for the Homeless and was rebranded to reflect changes and growth in their services. After a lot of research and much thought it was changed to ARC. The charity works in Taunton, Bridgwater, West Somerset and Wellington and has many properties in these areas, fifteen altogether which accommodates 176 homeless individuals. Lindley House which is well known accommodates 57 people. Among this accommodation are moves to provide more independent living. The aim is to support the clients so that they eventually secure their own homes. She stressed that they were not a housing association. The word homeless often has a negative connotation and when clients are in their service, they are no longer homeless.

ARC's head office was converted into an 8 bed accommodation for the homeless service veterans who needed specialised support. This was launched in February 2018 as Victory House and Rosie said that so far it has been a success. The staff have noticed that the veterans look after each other as a family and this has helped with their welfare.

There is also an Outreach Team who walk around giving support to anyone who may be rough sleeping. They also respond to report of rough sleepers and ensure these individuals are safe, warm and have access to food and drink. They also offer them accommodation at the centres and refer them to other services which may be helpful.

ARC academy is a college which provides a variety of free courses for all the clients so that they have the opportunity to gain skills, qualifications and improve self-confidence. The courses are run by volunteers and include English, Gardening, First Aid, Swimming and much more. ARC are also doing a lot more transition work now to help clients through their journeys.

ARC work with a number of corporates to help clients get back to work and these include practice interviews, CV writing skills, work experience, apprenticeships and offering part time and full-time work to those who are ready.

To help clients secure their own accommodation there is a scheme which teaches individuals how to be a good tenant and this increased their chances of securing and maintaining a tenancy. There is also another scheme which enables people on a low income who cannot afford a deposit to access the private rented sector. It works as a loan to cover the fees associated with private rents such as deposit and rent in advance. ARC like to ensure their clients get off to a good start in their new homes so they provide a small grant to purchase furniture at the local charity Furnitrust.

Some of the clients have dogs or cats and the PAWS project ensures these companions are also looked after. These include responding to the needs and welfare of the pets. Providing foster accommodation for a family pet when their owners are housed in temporary accommodation, subsidising vet visits and healthcare and also advising them on providing nutrition for the pets.

ARC offer help to males and females aged between 16-65+, different backgrounds and homeless individuals with no dependents.

Rosie was thanked for her extremely interesting talk and we all agreed that it was worth supporting Furnitrust to help people set up their homes."

This is a Road Safety initiative run by Somerset Road Safety aimed at raising awareness in the over 60's of the effects that aging can have on our driving skills. They are running a number of free morning sessions locally offering information on a range of different services together with a useful presentation about driving.

The following agencies are represented at the talks and offer information and goodies:

- Somerset Road Safety had Hi Vis jackets, key rings, torches and copies of highway code
- Advanced driving offering an assessed drive in your own car at a later date.
- Fire and rescue had information on Carbon monoxide, Home fire safety check and Thatches
- Age UK
- Aneurism's
- Pardoes solicitors

There were also a number of physical activities including blood pressure testing, eyesight tests and Driving skills test on a simulator.

The presentation, which was more interesting than this list suggests, covered:

- Assorted driving statistics on accidents
- Interactive tests on road signs
- Emphasis on fact they were not there to take away driving licences
- Short video clips on safety
- Make people think about getting older

Lydeard St Lawrence Tree Planting Project 2020



The opening meeting for this project was attended by 25 adults and children in the School Hub on the 23/01/20. The proposal, brainchild of Andy Colman, is to plant 100 trees in the village and environs. Each school child will have a named tree and the project will have an educational project. The trees will bring natural beauty to the area and may be an inspiration to other villages.

At the meeting we looked at historical maps of Lydeard St. Lawrence's woods and orchards. An online pamphlet is being developed that will be added to as the project progresses. Minutes of the meeting are below and <u>here</u> on the parish website.

The next step is to start conversations about planting sites with relevant people and organisations. The aim is to have the saplings and maybe some larger specimens in the ground by next Autumn/winter.

There was a much wider and interesting discussion addressing climate change, biodiversity and how the community can work together regarding these issues. Other interested people, including children, are welcome at the next meeting, at the same place on Thursday 19th March at 7.30 pm.

Lydeard St. Lawrence Tree Project Minutes from the Meeting Thursday 23rd January 2020

1. Welcome and Introductions

Andy Coleman welcomed all to the meeting and presented the idea of the project.

The aim is for the planting of 100 trees in the local area to happen next winter, which gives a year to put plans and arrangements in place. Every child in Lydeard St. Lawrence School will have the opportunity to plant a tree – a living legacy. The school will be able to use this project to study the environment, climate change and history of the area.

2. Where will this happen and what will be planted?

The project will identify areas where trees could be planted. This may be in hedgerows, fields, school grounds and existing woodland. This will require permission of landowners. Consideration needs to be given to position of power lines, road visibility, hedge cutting – may be necessary to consult with Highways.

Residents / landowners will be invited to identify areas or offer land for planting.

School – during Field School activities children will be encouraged to suggest areas for trees or hedging. The children can also be involved in seed collection and create a tree nursery, so they can increase their understanding of the process from seed to tree.

We will be planting native trees that are suitable to the area. Trees will need to be matched to the soil type and consideration given to 'future-proofing' keeping in mind climate change.

3. Where will the trees come from and how will this be funded?

Some of the trees will be sourced locally to support businesses in the area and buying locally grown trees will help prevent the introduction/spread of disease.

Funding would come from a variety of sources, for example: Woodland Trust, Tree Council, Quantock Hills.

It was suggested that some children may want to collect sponsorship in order to buy their tree.

4. Ongoing maintenance

After planting, there will need to be a small group of volunteers who check the trees, strim grass around them, remove tree guards when necessary etc.

It will be useful to have a core team in place prior to planting.

5. Research

Sarah Tickner presented the research she has completed so far regarding the history of trees in the local area. She showed the group a map from the 1830s which highlighted areas that were once conifer woods, orchards and where deciduous trees once grew. Interestingly, prior to the school being built the site was once an orchard. Glebelands was once the site of ancient woodland.

The 1880s map showed the presence of the school building, but still surrounded by an area of orchard. Bringing the maps up to date showed a significant decrease in trees and increase in buildings and farmland.

6. What are the next steps?

- Work needs to begin on identifying areas for planting and liaising with landowners.
- We need to start raising awareness of the project using the Village Newsletter, social media and word of mouth.
- Mike Campbell will write an article introducing the project for the Village Newsletter.
- Phil Tovey will begin drafting an information leaflet.
- Kate Campbell will research the possibility of planting in Glebelands.
- Hayley Slade will ensure information is included in the school newsletter.
- The children attending suggested speaking to the Head Teacher about the project Hayley Slade will work with the children to create a School Tree Council to promote and lead the activity within the school.

A question was raised regarding what the group is called. Do we need to find a name for the group? Possibly including 'tree' in the title might be limiting as to what the group can achieve. Nothing was decided upon at this meeting, so this is still open for discussion / suggestions.

SOMERSET ARCHAEOLOGICAL and NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY (SANHS)

John Periam of Milverton

John Periam was a major "mover and shaker" in this area around the turn of the 16th/17th centuries. Appointed Steward of Milverton by the King and as the attorney to many of the leading families, he became an important person in the area. One example of his career was to convert the Manor of Lydeard St Lawrence, which he had bought from the Duke of Somerset, into a trust for Roberts family. Subsequently, he acted as the prime trustee for over 30 years, following the early death of the other trustees. As a result, he became embroiled in a Chancery Law case, which led to him financing the trust for many years. Eventually, his heir sold the Manor to the Hancock family.

Periam died young, leaving many issues for his widow, Sarah, to sort out and she proved more than equal to that task. She brought up five children, ensuring that they had suitable marriage partners: Two intermarried with the Southey's of Fitzhead Court and two with the Lethbridges, later their heirs at Sandhill. In parallel, she solved a number of business issues left by his death.

Beware of computer support scams

Do you own a computer or any other type of digital device? If so, watch out for fraudsters who will try to steal your money or personal or financial information through computer support scams.

Common scams include:

- A cold caller claiming to be from a big company like Microsoft, saying there is a problem with your device and they need to access it to fix it.
- Unsolicited emails with attached security updates that are in fact viruses.
- Being asked for credit card details to validate your software.

Genuine computer companies won't call or email you out of the blue asking for personal or financial information or to fix your computer.

Follow this advice to stay safe:

- Delete suspicious emails without opening any attachments or replying to them.
- Hang up immediately on cold callers who claim there is a problem with your computer or ask
 you for personal or financial information.

If you are worried there may be a problem with your computer, you could:

- Contact the genuine company using the phone number on their paperwork or website.
- Ask for help at the shop where you bought it.
- Take it to a computer repair business that is member of the Buy With Confidence scheme. All Buy With Confidence businesses are vetted, approved and monitored by Trading Standards. Search at buywithconfidence.gov.uk or call 01392 383430.

Somerset West and Taunton Council Local Plan Consultation - January 2020

The Somerset West and Taunton Council Strategy Team are currently working on the Issues and Options document for the newly formed Somerset West and Taunton Council (excluding the Exmoor National Park area). The consultation will take place from

Monday 13th January to Monday 16th March 2020.

The Strategy Team are also inviting comments on two documents which are needed to support and evidence the Local Plan: The Sustainability Appraisal; and the Habitats Regulations Assessment.

This is the first consultation stage in the Local Plan process.
